

FROM THE DESK OF BOB BUCETTAS

I would like to update our ships history on my web site. That section has very little to say about us. The Owens was designed with a special purpose in mind. She was one of two new ships in the Carpenter class. The idea was to use them to test and develop ASW weapons and tactics for use on a future large destroyer. The weapons included MK 108 rocket Launcher, Weapon Alpha, Mk 15 trainable Hedge Hog, MK 23 Torpedo Tubes, and MK 9 depth charge. These weapons were coupled with the QHBa, OKA, QDA Sonar system and the MK100 underwater fire control system. The Rocket Launcher turned into ASROC, hedge hogs and depth charges were discontinued, and the torpedoes had a long development program becoming the major weapons of today. The Sonar and fire control were improved to match these developments. If you were involved in or know about these developments please share that knowledge with us. It will be used to enlarge our ships history on my web site.

The Carpenter was assigned to DESPAC and sent to Pearl Harbor. She spent most of her time in Korea and Viet Nam. Probably was little involved in ASW testing. The Robert Owens was assigned to DESLANT and sent to Key West Sonar School.. While there she used her Rocket Launcher in a test to sink the German submarine U2513. She later took part in Task Force Bravo, the Cuban Blockade and some astronaut recovery events. I would like to hear from you of your experiences during these periods and in how we were involved in developing these weapons. I remember that contractors were always aboard to modify the SONAR and Fire control. With your help we can develop a more interesting page for our ships history on my web site.

The Carpenter Class was later increased by six more ships, All DDE's. These were the Lloyd Thomas 764, and the Keppler 765, along with the Fred T Berry 858, Norris, 859, McCaferry 860 and Harwood 861. Did any of these ships ever sail with us?

As always the password for the Crews Page remains the same. Use the current sign in. I have not changed much lately, but hope to add more. There are some new links there and the latest NAVY TIMES newspaper is still available but the sign in has changed. The new sign in is posted there

AMERICAN HERITAGE LANDMARK TOURS TOUR PROPOSAL USS ROBERT A. OWENS

HISTORICAL & CULTURAL PHILADELPHIA NATIONAL CONSTITUTION CENTER

History comes alive as we walk in the footsteps of our Founding Fathers along brick walkways and cobblestone streets in Penn's "Green Countrie Towne," Philadelphia. This city, which served as the capital of the colony of Pennsylvania, the capital of Colonial America, and the Federal capital from 1790-1800, has a history that is unrivaled in America. In an area known as "America's Most Historic Square Mile," we visit or pass such sites as Independence Hall, where the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution were signed; the Liberty Bell, America's most cherished artifact now housed in a new Pavilion with interesting displays regarding the bell's history, Congress Hall, building used by both houses of Congress when Philadelphia served as the Federal capital, Elfreth's Alley, the oldest continuously occupied residential street in America, Betsy Ross House, Quaker seamstress who legend maintains made our first flag & whose home is an excellent example of the 18th c. working class residence; Franklin Court, site of the home of the famous Dr. Franklin, & Christ Church, Anglican church founded in 1695 where many of the founding fathers worshiped.

One of the highlights of the day will be a visit to the new **National Constitution Center**. "We, the People" is the preamble of the document establishing a system of government which has enabled the U.S. to flourish into the most successful republic in history. Washington called it a "miracle" and it remains such. This interactive facility is dedicated to help people better understand the Constitution and its impact on our lives as well as prepare us to be better citizens. What better location than the city of its birth!

Your tour will also include a driving overview of downtown Philadelphia including the **Penn's Landing** area along the Delaware waterfront, the charming 18th century neighborhood of **Society Hill** to see its many mansions, churches, cemeteries, and gardens, **City Hall**, which is the largest municipal building in the U.S., & the **Benjamin Franklin Parkway**, referred to as the "Champs Elysees of America. Brief stops at Logan Circle, beautiful "hub" and one of the original green areas set aside by founder, William Penn as well as view from atop the famous Rocky stairs to see much of the skyline of the city.

VALLEY FORGE ENCAMPMENT

Located in the "backyard" of the Embassy Suites is Valley Forge National Park, site of the winter encampment of 1777-78, the most pivotal period during the American Revolution. No other place associated with the American Revolution symbolizes the suffering, sacrifice and ultimate triumph of the soldier than Valley Forge. No battle was fought here, but there was survival against other enemies – low morale due to the losses at Brandywine & Germantown and the British capture and occupation of the capital city, Philadelphia, hunger, disease and the forces of nature. It was here that the American Army was born through the training established by Baron Friedrich von Steuben, it was here that the news of the French Alliance was first received.

Travel through some 3,500 acres of the beautiful rolling hills of this very historic site occupied by the Continental soldiers during the winter of 1777-78. At Muhlenberg's Brigade area you'll have the opportunity to visit authentically reconstructed huts, referred by Lafayette as being "scarcely gayer than the dungeons of Europe", earthen fortifications known as **redoubts** and a working example of a field "bake-oven". Imagine what it must have been like to "winter" here as did some 12,000 soldiers and hundreds of women and children.

Continuing on, we pass the National Memorial Arch, houses that were occupied by the officers, and the Valley Creek from which the Forge took its name, as we make our way to the home of Isaac Potts, the 18th century structure which served as **Washington's Headquarters**. We will tour this building and imagine the lifestyle of His Excellency and Mrs. Washington during their stay at the Forge. Not the level of comfort you might expect!

A short distance away is the **Grand Parade** where this "rag-tag" band of soldiers were trained under Baron von Steuben and transformed into the American Army. Hear how von Steuben was able to accomplish this "miracle" as well as the details of the celebration on May 6th when the French Alliance was announced to the Army. No tour of Valley Forge is complete without a visit to the beautiful **Washington Memorial Chapel**, built in the early 1900's to honor Washington and his men. A most beautiful site!
















David Kenneth Hayes, from Clinton, died July 6, 2016 at his residence.

His final days he was cared for lovingly by his daughter-in-law, Dione Michelle Hayes and Gentiva Hospice Care.

He chose cremation and no formal services. Frist Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.
