

KNOWLEDGE v. WISDOM

For those of you who belong to the American Legion you may have read the article in the April, 2020 issue titled "The Wisdom Gap". It is an extremely interesting article about the data and the knowledge we receive every day as opposed to years ago. It makes me think about the data and the knowledge that our children and grandchildren are getting and whether they can absorb it all intelligently.

The article, written by Alan W. Dowd, begins, "Before the 20th century, human knowledge doubled every hundred years. By the middle of the 20th century, it was every 25 years. Today, it's doubling every 13 months. In the near future, experts predict knowledge could double every 12 hours." The article claims that we are producing 2.5 million terabytes of data every day. To put that in perspective, researchers claim one (1) terabyte of data equals about 85 million pages of printed text!

To really shrink and paraphrase this article does not do it justice. It needs to be read. But the guts of the article relates all that data as something to be transferred by us into knowledge. But it is what we do with that knowledge that makes it critically important. The author states that the knowledge is not that helpful unless used with wisdom. Dowd quoted Professor James Kelly who told his students, "Knowledge is to wisdom as the raw material is to the manufactured article – crude and comparatively worthless." Therefore, wisdom is the key as to how well one uses the knowledge.

Using religion as examples, Dowd quotes everything from Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism and even Confucius as lauding wisdom. He says wisdom is not defined by a formula nor can be attained by a course of study. It is not an exact science, it's an imprecise quality. However, we all recognize it when we see it or hear it.

There is a "wisdom gap", as Dowd puts it, being created today in young people with all the social media, need for instant gratification, etc., that leaves them at risk to be swayed by anything or anybody. It is a generation that devalues and disregards faith, history and pillar institutions. It will be difficult for them to produce leaders with wisdom.

Wisdom is a quality we generally associate with age and living experience. This is true to an extent, but not always. Some people never learn! The good news is that it can be learned and passed along to future generations. It's up to us to do that. Please read Dowd's article. It would be wise of you to do so!



FROM THE DESK OF THE EDITOR

In 1989, Jim Holden Jr., began the USS R.A. Owens Shipmate Association. At that time, there were only a few people that were members but even so, he (and they) persevered and it is what it is today. They set the annual dues at a level that everyone could meet without difficulty (\$10.00 per year) and still allow the Association to do the things it would like to do. Things like donating to Navy Associations that assist our active and retired brothers and sisters in need. This is done each time one of our members passes and in their name. It has helped with the costs of the reunions, thereby decreasing the cost to the attending members each time. And it has paid for the printing of the PING newsletter all these years. The PING began in 1989 and has continued every year since that time. The web site began about 2005 and has been on the internet since that time. Both of these information items are for the benefit of the shipmates and their loved ones. However, they both cost the association hundreds of dollars per year which is just one more way the annual dues are used.

Currently we have 239 "active" members. Of those members, 167 receive their PING newsletter emailed to them by me each time it is published and if for some reason they miss it, they can look on the website and not only see the current edition, but several years of the PING as well. The balance of the membership (72) have no email capabilities (or have not informed us that they do) and receive a printed copy of the PING mailed to them at the Associations expense. I give you the numbers because of the following:

The last PING cost the \$392.00 for 72 people which averages out to \$5.45 per individual. At three times per year this would equate to \$16.35 per person. That means that the association is losing money each printing for each of those 72 people....it amounts to \$457.00 loss per year. Now comes the major problem...26 of those 72 people have not paid dues but are still on the rolls. If those 26 are dropped from the rolls due to not paying their dues, it will mean that the cost per person of the PING being mailed out to the remaining 46 will be \$8.57 per copy to those remaining. See the problem?? You have seen the notices from Gary Parks and myself about dues, and most have responded favorably, but it takes ALL of us to keep the Association afloat and viable.

Please, if you are receiving the PING (either through the mail or online) and are not sure where you stand on your dues, please contact Gary Parks (his information is on page 4) and find out.

NOW A QUESTION:

For those of you receiving the PING in print, is there a family member, a close friend, a close by relative that has email capability that we could send the PING to. They could then print the PING onto paper and give it to you to read at your leisure. This would be a great help in reducing the cost outlay per month. If there is someone that is willing to do this for you, please have them contact me at namwarrior41@yahoo.com and let me know who they would be receiving the PING for so that I can change the rosters to reflect this information.
