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

<u>Reunion Dates</u>—October 4, 2021 to October 8, 2021. We'll check in on Monday 10/4, with side trips on Tuesday 10/5, and Wednesday 10/6. The business meeting and banquet will be on Thursday 10/7, with check out Friday morning on 10/8. I'm planning a side trip for the ladies on Thursday, while we're having our business meeting, if we have enough participation.

If you'd like, you can arrive up to 2 days early, or stay up to 2 days later, to explore the city. The hotel has offered the same room rate if anyone decides to do so. The room rate is \$72.00 + 14% tax per night. Let the hotel know how long you'll be staying when making your reservations.

The hotel has blocked 25 rooms for us, but we are under no obligation to fill 25 rooms. Please make your reservations as soon as possible. If you are calling the hotel to make your reservations, tell them you're with "The Owens Ship Reunion". Give them the dates and they'll be able to pull it up on the computer. If you have any special room requests, make the hotel aware of them, i.e., handicapped accessible, etc. They can't guarantee they'll be able to accommodate your request, but every effort will be made if they can.

<u>Side Trips—</u>There are two trips scheduled for the group and possibly a trip for the ladies. On Tuesday 10/5, we'll travel to the Flight 93 National Memorial in Shanksville and then have lunch, "on our own", at the American Legion in Stoystown. The cost for this trip is \$35 per person. On Wednesday 10/6, we're planning a "Day in the 'Burgh". We'll start with a guided trolley tour through the various districts of the city, with lunch at Station Square, again "on our own". Then a guided tour of the HJ Heinz History Center. I haven't received the quote from the trolley company, as of this writing. As soon as I do, I'll get the final cost for Wednesday to Jerry for publication on the website and in the next Ping. On Thursday 10/7, we're planning a guided tour for the ladies to Phipps Conservatory, while we have our business meeting. The cost for this guided tour is \$55 per person.

<u>Banquet</u>—The banquet will be a buffet style dinner, Thursday evening at 6PM. There will be a cash bar right outside the ballroom. The cost for dinner will be \$35 per person, which includes tax & gratuity. The menu includes: Tossed Salad with Assorted Dressings

Thursday is based upon 10. If we don't get 10, we'll cancel the trip, however a smaller group could go in private vehicles and save the transportation fee, which is \$35 per person. If you'd like to check out their website, to see if you'd be interested, their website is www.phipps.conservatory.org.

Due to the pandemic, trying to put together the reunion has been challenging, to say the least. I'm glad I started before the country shut down. Because of the pandemic, I've had to list our lunches as "on our own". The restaurants I contacted aren't willing to put a solid price on anything a year in advance. In fact, I spoke to one of the stewards at the American Legion in Stoystown and she didn't know if they'd still be serving meals next year. If they aren't, we'll find an alternative. For the same reason, I've chosen the Station Square as the location for lunch on Wednesday, because there are over 10 restaurants to choose from, but again we'll be "on our own". If any changes need to be made to any part of the itinerary, we'll put on the website and in the Ping.

I was able to find a local transportation company which has 28 & 40 passenger buses, as well as the standard 56. I've priced our transportation using the 28-passenger bus, but if we have to step up to the 40, we can. When it comes to the tours, I tried to pick things that would appeal to the group, as a whole, but by no means is that all there is to do while you're here. Individually, or in small groups, I'm going to recommend touring the city on the Gateway Clipper, which is a river paddle wheeler; or going to Mt Washington to enjoy the panoramic views of the city and/or enjoying one of the 4, or 5, star restaurants (reservations required); or having dinner at the Grand Concourse Restaurant (reservations required) in Station Square, or riding one of the 2 inclines; or gong to Rivers Casino; or touring Soldiers & Sailors Memorial Hall; not to mention the local restaurants and attractions in the Monroeville/Penn Hills/Wilkins area, where we'll be staying. Most of the upscale restaurants require reservations and business casual attire. I can provide addresses and phone numbers if you're interested.

At the beginning of October, the leaves usually start to change. I'm hoping we'll be able to enjoy some eye-candy during the bus ride to and from the Flight 93 Memorial. As you know, 2021 will be the 20th anniversary of the attack. I assume the National Park Service will be providing some type of special exhibit. The other thing to keep in mind is, the Steelers and Penguins are <u>typically</u> playing in October. If it works out, you may be able to catch a football, or hockey, game while you're in town.

I hope by keeping the cost for the rooms below \$100 a night and the cost for the reunion almost the same as it was in Charleston 2 years ago, you'll be able to fit it into your budget. SHIPMATES TO REMEMBER

When I went aboard OWENS in May, 1967, upon her return from a Med cruise, I remember a man in the Second Division who epitomized the salty, old sailor of whom we always heard. He was tall and lanky and kind of a quiet man; but a very likeable person at the same time. I was assigned to the First Division on the deck force, so didn't have any professional dealings with him other than to know he was in charge of the guns.

This man was GMG1 Myron J. Mankey. He was on board for 8 years, from 1960 to late 1968 when he made "SEAVEY" and was eligible for shore duty. Gunnersmates didn't qualify very often in their career for shore duty – not much need on shore for someone who was an expert with the 5"38 gun mount. The problem with Mankey getting shore duty was that he was to be assigned to a recruiting station. Problem, you say? Well, back then to be a recruiter, according to Mankey, was that one had to be able to type about 20 words a minute (back then it was on a manual typewriter).

I was now working in the weapons office as the weapons yeoman, only because I was one of the only newer guys on board who knew how to type. When I went to the weapons office it irked some of the Boatswains Mates because they lost control over one of the seamen who were part of their slave labor force. I now worked for the Weapons Officer and the division officers under "WEPS". But back to Mankey.

Myron came into my office one evening and asked me if I could teach him to type. He explained he needed to know that in order to be a recruiter. I knew in my heart that he would make a great recruiter as he was a very good, honest man. For some reason, there was a beginner's typing book in the office. So, I had him sit at my typewriter and showed him where to place his fingers correctly over the "home row" of keys. I explained he could reach every other key on the board with one finger or another from that location. Remembering how we learned in high school, I took him through a couple of brief drills. He said he was fine and if he could use the book he would take it from there. I was skeptical that someone could teach themselves how to type out of a book with no other help. I was wrong.

Long story short, that man sat at my typewriter every night, learning and practicing and taught himself how to type. That certainly showed me his tenacity, intelligence and unique ability to learn. He left the OWENS to become a recruiter and I never saw him again. Myron J. Mankey passed away in 2000. I have never forgotten him.
